Formed in September, 1989, **The National Coalition for Peace in Angola (NCPA)** and the **Washington Area Coalition for Peace in Angola (WACPA)** have been formed to mobilize public opposition in the United States, and in the Washington metropolitan area, to the Bush administration's current policy toward Angola. NCPA and WACPA **a)** oppose U.S. military aid to the South African-supported UNITA rebels fighting to topple the Angolan government **b)** support U.S. recognition of The People's Republic of Angola and normalized relations between the two countries **c)** demand that the U.S. back the African-sponsored peace plan known as the Gbadolite accords **d)** denounce and oppose the use of millions in U.S. taxpayer money to maim and murder Angolan children, women and men while basic human needs go unmet here at home. NCPA and WACPA organized protest demonstrations in New York and Washington, D.C. against UNITA rebel leader Jonas Savimbi during his U.S. visit in September.

**What you can do to change U.S. policy toward Angola and
help the people of Angola:**

- a) Organize educational forums, workshops and rallies at schools, churches, community centers and union halls. Utilize speakers, videos, films and educational fact sheets and packets available from anti-apartheid groups and The Angola Foundation.
- b) Organize material aid campaigns on behalf of the people of Angola. The people of Angola are in desperate need of medical and educational supplies and technical assistance due to the enormous devastation of the Angolan economy.
- c) Organize visits to The People's Republic of Angola to see and experience, first-hand, the situation there. The U.S. government and major media organizations have frequently distorted the reality of the situation in Angola.
- d) Write letters to newspapers and broadcast media organizations to express your views about U.S. policy toward Angola. Journalists are often ill-informed about Angola and receive biased information from the U.S. government which has sided with South Africa to intervene militarily in Angola.
- e) Write your representative in Congress and President George Bush. Congressional committees have approved aid to UNITA in secret at the request of Bush and the CIA.
- f) Circulate the petitions produced for the national petition campaign sponsored by The National Coalition for Peace in Angola and The Angola Foundation. **Our goal is to collect one million signatures for peace in Angola.**
