

NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY INTEREST IN SOUTH AFRICA

IBM: South Africa has expanded its pass system for non-whites into a "Book of Life" system for all. This means everyone must carry a book close to a hundred pages long containing every facet of their life. This system is computerized consisting of an IBM 360/50 leased to the South African Government. Northwestern's assets in IBM are \$7,095,968.00.

GULF OIL CORP.: Angola, Mozambique, and Guinea Bissau are presently fighting to remove Portugal, their colonial oppressor. Portugal is the last colony holder in Africa. Portugal, the poorest country in Europe, would not be able to continue their African wars if it were not for Gulf Oil. Gulf has major operations in Angola and their annual payments to the Portuguese colonial government finances half of its military efforts. Northwestern owns \$3,129,767.00 in stock in Gulf.

GM: The automotive industry, as a part of heavy industry, is a vital segment of any economy. GM has built large assembly plants in South Africa, as have many other multinational corporations, in order to take advantage of the low wage level among black workers that are maintained by the South African regime. South Africa is good for GM. Add to this the technical capital and investment it brings and it becomes clear that GM is very important in sustaining the regime's power.

It is no coincidence that these multinational corporations are taking a supportive role in maintaining the oppressive regimes and economies of Southern Africa. Their interests are the same and have the same effect: 1) To maximize capital profits at the expense of the indigenous people in these countries, and 2) To ensure the security of their investments and profit uptake in these countries through the suppression of National Liberation struggles in the Third World, either directly, as in Vietnam, or indirectly through colonial governments, as in Southern Africa.

LIBERATION MOVEMENTS IN AFRICA

During the past decade, Black liberation movements have been intensifying their struggle against white racist regimes in Africa. The following is a synopsis of the various liberation struggles.

MOZAMBIQUE

With eight years of experience in fighting Portugal's colonial forces, the Mozambique Liberation Front (FRELIMO) is one of the most effective fighting organizations in the world. Samora Machel, FRELIMO's president, is a superb tactician. FRELIMO's activities have mainly centered around the Cabora Bassa Dam in Mozambique.

GUINEA BISSEAU (Portuguese Guinea)

The African Party for the Independence of Guinea and Cape Verde (PAIGC), has already controlled 2/3 of the countryside in Guinea Bissau. Although its brilliant leader, Amilcar Cabral was assassinated, PAIGC continues to wage a defiant struggle against colonialism.

ANGOLA

There are three liberation movements operating in Angola. They are: The National Union for the Total Independence of Angola (UNITA), the Popular Liberation Movement (MPLA), and the Revolutionary Government in Exile (GRAE). MPLA and GRAE have launched their attacks along the densely forested area in northeastern Angola.

ZIMBABWE (Rhodesia)

In Zimbabwe, there is the Zimbabwe African National Union (ZANU), and Zimbabwe African People's Union (ZAPU). They joined to form the Front for Liberation of Zimbabwe (FROLIZI) which is run by a joint military command.

AZANIA (South Africa)

The Southwest African's People's Organization (SWAPO), limits its activities to the laying of mines. The African National Congress (ANC) and the Pan-African Congress (PAC) serve as powerful propaganda organizations in Azania.

A separate air-mail letter should be sent to the particular liberation movement office indicating the nature of the package sent, date sent, and sending group.

II. non-military aid:

- A. lightweight waterproff equipment such as tents, knapsacks and
clothing. In relief shipment of clothes, mens clothes and shoes are
scarce. Thousands of pairs of sturdy men's trousers (or shorts)
boots and works shoes are needed (preferably soft-soled because
of the type of terrain.) Raincoats are also needed----send average
B. sizes.
- B. Medical supplies and drugs.
- C. Education. Funds are heeded for buying textbooks and library books;
funds for printing textbooks written in African vernaculars;
school supplies such as paper, pencils, chalk, fabric and non-electric
sewing machimes; soccer balls and guitars.
- D. Transportation. The purchase of ambulances, landrovers, five-ton
trucks, eight-ton trucks, cars bicycles, motorcycles---for use in
camps, schools, hospitals, and for transportation within the region.
- E. Refugee Needs. Funds for the operating budget at the orphange
where children whose parents have been murdered or separated are
kept; the purchase of clothing, blankets, soap, toothbrushes, etc.,
for the displaced and disable.
- F. Communications. The purchase of cameras, dark room supplies, tape
recorders and tapes for publicity work and internal communications.
- G. Office Supplies. The purchase of equipment from file cabinets and
typewriters to mimeograph ink and paper.
