Dear Friends,


Many of you will have had as intense a summer as we did, working to ensure that Congress adopted significant sanctions. The process is not over - but I think we can be sure of two things. First, there will be some sanctions this year and second, they will not be tough enough to achieve more than token pressure on apartheid South Africa.

So the struggle continues. I know you will be involved in many different ways. I enclose some new material you may find helpful. We are publishing "Questions and Answers on Sanctions" now because it is vital that the nationwide wave of support for sanctions does not crest and die, but keeps building, till we have swept away all U.S. props to apartheid.

You may also find our public statement in support of full sanctions endorsed by major trade union, civil rights and religious leadership useful and I have also enclosed a new literature list.

Please keep in touch and let us know what you are doing, what resources you would find helpful and we'll keep you briefed on our campaigns.

P.S. No one knows how many detainees there are - perhaps 16,000 or more - the State hides names and figures - and a prisoner at the mercy of South Africa's police is terrifyingly vulnerable. Some are old friends of mine and I think of them through the night, but each of the thousands is equally precious, and all are in jeopardy.

The Senate Should Adopt Full Economic Sanctions Against South Africa

Public Statement on Sanctions

The crisis of mass protest, arrests, police killings and censorship continues to escalate in South Africa today. The government of P.W. Botha blatantly defies the demand of the majority for a nonracial, democratic state based on one-person, one vote. Leaders of the freedom movement have called on the international community to apply comprehensive economic sanctions in support of their demands to eradicate apartheid.

The United States House of Representatives has responded to this call and passed the Anti-Apartheid Act of 1986, which would end all trade and investment in South Africa. This legislation has been introduced in the Senate by Senators Kennedy, Weicker and Cranston as S. 2570.

The time for quiet diplomacy and symbolic gestures has passed. We urge the Senate to place Congress squarely on the side of freedom in South Africa by adopting these comprehensive economic sanctions now.
