Finances

Mary McAnally attended the UCM general committee meeting in Boston, at which it was decided to give SAC \$2,000.00 for the next year. This financial matter raises the question, again, of whether SAC will continue as a committee of UCM (and must therefore recruit more student members) or will find a new status.

Newsletter

Tim and Dick will recruit help for future label-gluing.

A group has met with Leon Howell to evaluate the newsletter. Format changes were suggested, some of which have been made in the latest issue. Stephanie hopes to hold a meeting with contributors to review procedures.

AAI

Gail, Mary, Ken, and Tim will form a subcommittee to discuss SAC's next moves regarding AAI.

Bank Campaign

Questions concerning the bank campaign were revived, i.e., which denominations should be the target, which groups (SAC, campus groups, and/or perhaps the NCC staff association) should push the campaign. It was suggested that a memo be written of the history of the campaign and the present situation and that it be circulated to other groups asking support in a united effort. Gail will write the memo.

Tim mentioned that Gary Busch of UAW is interested in SAC activity in investments.

NCC

Gail and Tim attended the November 4 meeting of the NCC DIA-DOM combined strategy task force on southern Africa. Murray MacInnis was commissioned to work half time on southern Africa; he will perhaps hire a student to assist him. Future moves will be discussed at another meeting December 9.

Scholarships

COEMAR has voted \$10,000 for scholarships for Fort Hare students in South Africa; \$150,000 for people from minority groups to attend ecumenical meetings abroad; and one \$2,000 scholarship for one person to study in southern Africa in 1969 (January through December) and concurrently assist SAC.

Meetings

Willis Logan will attend meetings in Atlanta in December of UCM (including the black caucus) and a Presbyterian international relations meeting.

A conference on Nigeria-Biafra will be held December 6-7-8 at Columbia. Information is available from Janet.

Meetings were planned with Mr. Kozingwuse of South West Africa and Dantje Oosthuizen of South Africa.

Janet distributed lists of families in South Africa who might welcome greetings from SAC members.

Mozambique

Engagements have been made for Kahn and Marupa to speak on WRVR and for Kahn to visit Harvard, Yale, Cornell, Union, and possibly the University of Chicago.

Dr. has been in touch with many people, including black groups, about the possible Committee for a Free Mozambique. The main questions at the moment are procedural.

Artur Vilankulu, Philip Mashkil, and Alfred Mondlane (the last two Mozambicans studying in the U.S.) spoke about current happenings in Dar es Salaam.
